

Yule

The season is upon us! It's the "battle for Yule"! While I won't bore you with all the details of this particular spoke on the wheel of the year, I couldn't help but talk about the question: why do we call it "Yule"?

As with most of the terms we lay claim to as Pagans "Yule" has a rather complex and disputed etymology. Suffice to say that it is borrowed from the Scandinavian and referred to a wide range of timer periods, from November through January. In the Scandinavian and Germanic languages it refers to both Yule and Christmas. In its current usage it is a general term, one that comes to mean an inclusive set of winter festivities surrounding the Solstice.

There was historically no universal "Pagan" holiday around December and midwinter. We have created that. Instead there were many, many different festivals and associations that occurred during the time of the Solstice. In adopting the Wiccan calendar of Sabbats we have established a liturgical calendar for ourselves, a cycle within the year which we can use to guide and structure our rituals, and keep both our selves and our rituals in tune with the seasons.

Yule gives us a way to celebrate the return of light, both within ourselves, amongst ourselves, and in the world. It is a happy time, one that reminds us why we should be merry despite all that life gives us.

Snowflakes

Each and every one of us is unique, and as our light spreads it leaves many different impressions behind it. During the ritual we will construct snowflakes from various materials and markers. Make the snowflakes represent something wonderful you would like to tell someone. Or something amazing you would like to have happen. Be yourself, put yourself into your snowflake, it will represent the light that you want to give to others. Make as many as you want. But as you make them remember that they are made to give away, to others in the circle, or to those in your life who are not here. For the magic to happen you will have to give them to somebody, no cheating by putting them on the altar! The snowflakes represent a way to spread light and cheer this season.
